CURRICULUM DETAILS

The Strathearn Curriculum at Key Stage 3 aims to give every girl in Years 8-10 a broad, balanced and appropriately challenging education.

In Year 8, pupils study the following subjects:

Art and Design, English (incorporating Drama), French, Geography, History, Home Economics, Information & Communication Technology (ICT), Mathematics, Music, Physical Education, Religious Studies, Science and Technology.

In Years 9 and 10 this is supplemented by German or Spanish.

In Year 10 the girls study Biology, Chemistry and Physics as separate Science subjects.

In the weekly Learning for Life and Work period(s), led by their Form Teacher, the girls investigate a range of themes, including Personal Development, Employability (including Careers Education) and Local and Global Citizenship.

The Curriculum at Key Stage 4 (GCSE) aims to continue this broad, balanced and appropriately challenging educational experience for every girl in Years 11 and 12. We aim to lay a secure foundation for her progression to A Level and so all of the girls study a core set of subjects:

English, English Literature, Mathematics, a modern foreign language, a Science subject, Physical Education and Religious Studies.

Subjects offered at this stage also include:

Further Mathematics, Art and Design, Biology, Business Studies, Chemistry, Design & Technology, Digital Technology (ICT), Double Award Science, Drama, French, Geography, German, History, Home Economics, Music, Physics, Spanish.

In general pupils will be entered for a total of nine GCSE subjects. The girls continue to investigate further themes in the areas of Personal Development, Employability and Citizenship as part of Learning for Life and Work period led by their Form Teacher.

In our Sixth Form the girls generally choose four subjects for study to AS Level in the Lower Sixth and they continue to study three of these to Advanced (A2) Level in their final year at Strathearn.

This year pupils have made choices from:

Art & Design, Biology, Business Studies, Chemistry, Computer Science, Design & Technology, Digital Technology, Drama, English Literature, French, Government & Politics, Geography, German, History, Health & Social Care, Nutrition & Food, Mathematics, Further Mathematics, Media Studies, Moving Image Art, Music, Psychology, Physics, Religious Studies and Spanish.

In L6 pupils continue to meet with their Form Teacher for one period a week; additionally, they have one period dedicated to Careers Education Information & Guidance.

CAREERS EDUCATION AND GUIDANCE

Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance (CEIAG) is a vital aspect of the educational provision at Strathearn. Formal timetabled careers modules are included in the Learning for Life and Work programme for Years 10 and 12 and as a distinct subject (Careers) for Years 13 and 14. Years 10, 12 and 13 are encouraged to complete personal career plans.

Careers advice and guidance are provided on an individual basis from Year 10 upwards where relevant, or when requested. The School has a Head of Careers who is available for consultation by the students throughout the school day, and by parents and pupils at Parent Consultations and Parent Information Evenings. Structured introductory and on-going visits to the careers suite take place form from Year 8. Year 10 has a half-day conference on career planning which involves guidance choosing GCSE subjects, completing a career profiling questionnaire and learning about current labour market information. All girls and their parents have the opportunity for have formal meetings with the Teaching & Learning VP, Head of Careers or Careers department staff in March to help pupils choose GCSE subjects.

Close links are maintained with a range of NI employers and the NI Careers Service; all pupils in Year 12 have a formal careers guidance interview with a careers adviser from the Department of the Economy.

Students in Years 13 and 14 are encouraged to attend relevant Professional and University Open Days, subject specific conferences and Higher Education Fairs. These have been completed by webinars due to the pandemic. Year 14 students also have the opportunity to participate in a formal interview situation and Oxbridge applicants are given additional interview practice. Interview workshops are also held in school for girls applying to medicine, dentistry, veterinary science, nursing and teaching. All pupils can have practice interviews with the careers adviser.

External speakers are regularly invited to talk to pupils in Years 12 and 13 about a range of career opportunities based on the Year 12's most popular career areas. The large majority of our Sixth Form leavers proceed to Higher Education Institutions in Northern Ireland and Great Britain. A few pupils have gone on to study in the USA and Europe and our girls have also been successful in securing places on apprenticeship and higher apprenticeship programmes.

The Careers calendar which is available on the school website, has more details of events which are running throughout the year.

SCHOOL-COMMUNITY LINKS

School Community Links have been somewhat curtailed due to the onset of Covid-19. The School continues to keep open channels of communication with its immediate stakeholders by use of electronic methods such as email, webinars and telephone meetings to ensure that everyone is kept updated.

The School has updated its website to allow all news and events to be reported. The School continues to be involved in internal charity events that raise significant funds for local charities and beyond. We have also contributed goods and groceries for The Larder Foodbank. Each of our Houses also have a named charity and the girls are involved in fundraising through House events.

Links with the World of Work

As part of the Learning for Life and Work programme at Key Stage 3 and 4 pupils are given the opportunity to listen to and interact with a variety of outside agencies from business such as Young Enterprise, voluntary organisations eg, Love for Life and the Simon Community as well as the PSNI.

Students also study aspects of entrepreneurship and enterprise as part of the teaching programme. These links are extended at sixth form for example through voluntary work at local primary schools and nursing homes, peer mentor training by Childline and of course through the numerous careers talks, Year 13 work experience and the Year 14 mock interview evening (see Careers Education and Guidance).

We are grateful to the many people who give freely of their time and expertise to advise our pupils about the world of work.

Sport

Aims

Strathearn aims to contribute to the physical development of each pupil through the promotion of skill acquisition and competence in a range of physical activities and to contribute to the social education of the individual by providing opportunities for pupils to co-operate with one another.

Additionally, we promote enjoyment through participation and help pupils understand the positive contribution of exercise to personal health and fitness.

Strathearn also encourages its pupils to make active, creative and purposeful use of their leisure time and through a varied inter-school competitive programme, prepare individuals and teams to experience a sense of satisfaction and achievement.

Programme of Study

At Key Stage 3, pupils have a time allocation of 1 hour and 45 minutes.

In Year 8, pupils experience the following activities: gymnastics, dance, hockey, swimming, netball, athletics, tennis, rounders and minor games.

In Year 9, the programme is further developed.

In Year 10, in addition to the activities taught in Year 9, badminton is introduced as well as an introductory unit on health-related fitness and use of the fitness suite.

At Key Stage 4, pupils have a time allocation of 1 hour and 10 minutes.

In Years 11 and 12, pupils engage in a thorough health-related fitness component involving aerobics, use of the fitness suite and fitness awareness. Other selected activities include basketball, volleyball, badminton, rugby, orienteering, tennis, athletics, cricket and rounders. Physical Education is offered as a GCSE option; where both theoretical and practical aspects of selected physical activities are studied in depth.

Extra-Curricular Programme

A comprehensive extra-curricular programme complements the core activities taught at the key stages. Pupils are provided with the opportunity to participate in the following team and individual activities:

In Years $8-10 \sim$ hockey, netball, cross-country, tennis, athletics, badminton, gymnastics, dance, football, volleyball and table-tennis.

In Years 11-14 ~ hockey, netball, cross-country, tennis, athletics, badminton, gymnastics, dance, football, volleyball, table-tennis and fitness.

Those pupils who have a keen interest in swimming, horse riding, golf, squash and trampolining are supported by the Physical Education Department and represent the school in competitive events.

Sports Facilities available to Pupils of the School

Sports Hall, Gymnasium and Fitness Suite

The School has a large, purpose-built Sports Hall, funded entirely by parental contribution. Accommodation within the Sports Hall is flexible, and allows for: a full size indoor hockey pitch; five badminton courts; indoor tennis court; netball; volleyball; basketball, with provision for gymnastics.

A fully equipped Gymnasium complements the use of the Sports Hall and a state-of-the-art Fitness Suite completes the indoor sports accommodation.

Outdoor Facilities

One synthetic and two all-weather hockey pitches; athletics track including a double long jump pit with tartan track run-up and caged throwing area. There are a total of six astro turf tennis courts on site.

Outside School

Access to the CIYMS synthetic hockey pitch, adjacent to the school, is available for both junior and senior teams and this is in addition to the tennis facilities if and when required. Swimming takes place at Lisnasharragh Leisure Centre.

Assessment and reporting

End of Key Stage Assessment Results 2020/21 – on hold

School Reports (P1-P7) in January and June. GL Assessment scores (P3-P7) reported to parents twice a year. J Walls, Assessment Coordinator, has coordinated the GL process and collated the data for staff. Parent Teacher Consultations took place in October 2020 and June 2021 by telephone.

Sport

- Pupils in the Preparatory Department take part in hockey, swimming, athletics, netball, rounders, cross-country, gymnastics and dance as part of their Physical Education Programme of Study. The following extra-curricular clubs are also run by the PE Department: hockey (P6-P7), athletics (P6-P7), cricket (P6-P7).
- Pupils can compete in a variety of sports events at inter-form, inter-house and inter-school levels. Teams from Penrhyn are selected for athletics, hockey, cricket, cross-country, swimming and gold but covid-19 restrictions this year caused the cancellation of many activities. During the 2020-2021 school year no inter-school competitions took place due to Covid restrictions. However, the girls competed in inter-house cross-country, hockey, netball and rounders. The 2021 Sports Day took place in class bubbles with videos and photos sent home to parents.

School Community Links

With Covid 19 restrictions in place our normal fund raising, and charity events could not happen. The money raised in 2020/21 totalled £285.54 from non-uniform days and we donated the money to NSPCC.

Visitors

This year restrictions meant that we could not invite visitors into school to speak to the pupils. We used Zoom meetings to have virtual meetings including, for example:

- In P3 a parent who works as a dentist linked up with the class to teach the girls about teeth.
- In P4 the girls linked, via Zoom, with Tim Peake, military officer, and European Space Agency Astronaut.
- In P7, the girls explored 'International Women's Day' with guest speaker Laura Blair an Army Major from N Ireland. Lorcan Murray, from Stranmillis, was invited to join a class lesson, engaging as part of his 4th year dissertation. P7 pupils engaged in a Microbiology Science workshop with Dr. Oyama. They also linked via Zoom with Miss Stewart from Strathearn to explore P7 transition to Year 8.

School Trips have not been possible during 2020/21.

- F/KS1 outdoor parties, class picnics, the Secret Garden and Rainbow Garden areas have been further developed to facilitate our detailed programme of activities for outdoor learning.
- KS2 In the absence of school trips, Key Stage 2 classes had a much greater focus on outdoor learning and teachers found new ways to utilize our school environment. They also made extensive use of the senior school ICT facilities, visiting each week, for activities. The girls communicated with other children their age by posting comments on the Newsdesk platform. With a thorough risk assessment in place P7 enjoyed a trip to Eden Pottery (outdoor marquee).

Penrhyn Committee

The Penrhyn Committee continues to provide excellent leadership support to the Preparatory Department.

In 2020/21 meetings were held via Zoom.

Early Morning and Afterschool Facility

Early Morning Club is well established and there are three members of staff each day. Pupils can be left at school from 8.00 am at no extra charge. This facility has proved very popular with parents. Also, our Afterschool Club offers a childcare facility from 2.00 pm until 5.45 pm and the club runs at close to full capacity most days. We have two permanent staff members, and a further member of staff can assist when numbers are high. Penrhyn Afterschool Club is held in the Assembly Hall and the pupils are organised in class bubbles.

INFORMATION ABOUT THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS 2020/21

At present, the school's Board of Governors has a total of 19 members. The composition of the Board is determined in accordance with the provision of the 1989 Education Reform Order under a scheme of management approved by the Department of Education in June 1987. There are four main categories of membership:

1 Foundation Governors

The Scheme of Management provides for the appointment by the Board itself of eight members, at least one of whom shall at the time of appointment be a parent of a pupil at the school. These appointees are elected at the Annual General Meetings of the School to serve for a term of three years.

Mrs Lynsey Mallon (Chair)

Lynsey Mallon joined the Board in July 2009 and was appointed Chair in June 2019. She has served as Chair of the Legal Committee and is an ex-officio member of all Board Committees. Lynsey qualified as a solicitor in 2004 and is a Partner in a leading Irish law firm. Lynsey is a former Head Girl of Strathearn and currently has two daughters at the school.

Mrs Patricia Stewart (Vice-Chair)

Patricia Stewart was elected as a Governor in April 2002 and was Chair from June 2014 to June 2019. She is a Non-Executive Director with the Business Services Organisation; the NI Member of the NHS Pay Review Body; a lay member of the Tax Tribunal and Associate Consultant with the NHS Leadership Centre. Mrs Stewart has one daughter who is a former pupil of the school.

Mrs Rosemary Bailie (Vice-Chair)

Rosemary Bailie was appointed to the Board in July 2014 and was a manager in the Probation Board for Northern Ireland, recently retired. She is the designated governor for child protection and was appointed Vice-Chair in June 2019.

Mrs Caroline Auchmuty

Caroline Auchmuty is a businesswoman with over 25 years' experience in Human Resources. She joined the Board in 1997 and is an Old Girl of Strathearn. Mrs Auchmuty is Chair of the Personnel Committee.

Mr Wallace Forde MBE

Wallace Forde is a chartered accountant and has served on the Board since February 1991. He is a former Chair and Vice-Chair and a former Chair of the Finance, Audit and Buildings Committee of the Board. His two daughters are former pupils of the school.

Mr Norman McKeown

Norman McKeown is a chartered accountant and businessman. He was appointed to the Board of Governors in January 2001 and is currently Chair of the Finance, Audit and Buildings Committee of the Board. His two daughters are former pupils of the school.

Mr Ian Noad

Ian Noad is a retired businessman and is a former Chairman of the Board. He became a foundation governor in June 1997 when his term of office as an elected Parent Governor ended. He has served as Chair of the Health and Safety Committee and is currently Chair of the Curriculum Committee. His two daughters are former pupils.

Mr Patrick White

Patrick White is a solicitor who was first elected to serve on the Board in November 1996. He has served as Chair of the Board of Governors and as Chair of the Legal and Fundraising Committees. His two daughters are former pupils of the school.

2 Nominated Governors

These members are appointed to the Board on the nomination of the Department of Education to hold office for four years;

Mr Robin Masefield CBE

Robin Masefield is a retired Senior Civil Servant. He served on the Board from 2002-2009 and again from July 2014 as a Nominated Governor of the Department of Education. He is in his second term as a Nominated Governor and is currently Chair of the Penrhyn Committee of the Board.

Mr Jonathan Ireland

Jonathan Ireland is Co-Founder of a Belfast-based strategic communication and reputation management firm. He has served as a Nominated Governor since March 2018 and chaired the Strathearn 90th Anniversary Committee.

Mr Christopher Wallace

Christopher Wallace is a solicitor in the public sector. He has served on the board from March 2018 as a Nominated Governor of the Department of Education. He has several family members who are past pupils of the school is Chair of the Legal Committee of the Board.

Mr Scott Rodham-Boyd

Scott Rodham-Boyd is a Chartered Manager and Management Consultant leading a transformational change programme within a large consultancy firm. He has served as a Nominated Governor since March 2018.

3 Parent Governors

Two parents are elected by secret ballot by parents of the school to hold office for four years ending in June 2021.

Mr Richard Brown

Richard Brown is a businessman and was elected as a Parent Governor in June 2017. He has two daughters currently at the school.

Mrs Deborah Nield

Deborah Nield is a GP Practice Manager and was elected as a Parent Governor in June 2017. She has one daughter currently at the school.

4 Teacher Governors

Two teachers are elected by secret ballot by assistant teachers at the school to serve for a term of four years. The election was held in May 2017.

Mrs Erin Andrews

Erin Andrews joined the staff of Strathearn School Preparatory Department in September 2013. She is currently the Co-ordinator for School Development and Pastoral Care in the Preparatory Department.

Mrs Jacqueline Gray

Jacqueline Gray joined the staff in September 1998. She is Teacher in Charge of Biology as well as being School Timetabler.

5 Co-Opted Governors

One governor has been co-opted to the full Board due to his extensive business experience.

Mr Raymond McGowan

Raymond McGowan joined the Board in July 2009. He is a retired quantity surveyor and has one daughter who is a former pupil of the school. Mr McGowan is Chair of the Health and Safety Committee of the Board.

Mrs Nicola Connery (School Principal) is also a member of the Board.

Covid 19 Report

A rather unexpected section in this year's annual report. In March 2020, following the first cases of coronavirus infection in Northern Ireland, all schools were instructed to close from Monday, 23 March; just a few weeks before the Easter holidays.

Throughout the closure staff completed remote learning, pupils in the senior school communicated via the online platforms of Microsoft Teams or Google Classroom. The Preparatory Department predominately used the Seesaw platform to provide teaching and learning for all pupils from Prep 1 to Prep 7.

Strathearn School in conjunction with Campbell College offered childcare supervision for keyworkers during lockdown, a volunteer staff rota was in operation which included the Easter holiday period.

The Board of Governors continued to operate all committees and full board meetings via zoom and the Principal supplied fortnightly reports.

As the announcement came from DE and CCEA that there would be no formal examinations in Summer 2020, the Curriculum Committee of the Board of Governors reviewed detailed data of the procedures to be followed by staff in the assignment of pupil grades. There was a huge commitment by staff in relation to the difficult process of grade assessments and undertaking this work in a fair and balanced manner.

The Board is grateful to the nonteaching staff for continuing to keep the school operational throughout this difficult time.

Arrangements for the restart of the school year were constantly updated due to changing DE and PHA guidance throughout August to ensure that all regulations were adhered to such as formation of class bubbles, social distancing, staggered breaks. At all times the pupils and staff wellbeing were at the fore of any decisions.
