Mr Manning then invited two pupils, Kate Farrelly and Katherine Hunter, up to the stage to chat about their experiences over the last academic year – Kate in her role as Games Captain and Katherine in relation to her involvement in the History and Languages trip to Belgium and France.

The Chair of the Board then introduced our Guest of Honour, Dr Judy Brown, a former Strathearn pupil who now works for the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade in Dublin. Dr Brown presented the prizes and awards, congratulating the prize winners in her subsequent speech. Dr Brown also reminded the audience that there are very many valuable activities in life that do not lead to awards and prizes. She also urged the girls not to lose heart if they experience disappointment, advising that this simply means that they have to take a different route to their desired destination. After a presentation to our Guest of Honour by the Deputy Head Girls, Sarah Brown and Kerry Hepworth, the Chamber Choir brought the evening to a close with beautiful performances of 'Over the rainbow' and 'Nothin' gonna stumble my feet'.

Careers Update Greenhill Trip

The new term got underway for the Careers Department with the UCAS Parents' Information evening on 1 September. This gave U6 parents the opportunity to learn more about the UCAS application process, and have the chance to talk to staff afterwards to get any queries or issues addressed. Parents also heard about the careers programmes for Forms 4 to U6 which ran throughout September.

All of U6 attended the Queen's Open Day and the Methodist College Options XXIV careers event which allowed our girls to get many last-minute questions answered before submitting their UCAS forms. Several pupils attended the Ulster University Open Days at Jordanstown, Coleraine and Magee.

We welcomed a range of speakers during this part of the autumn term. PwC staff talked to our girls about their programmes for school leavers and graduates, and the RAF talked to girls from Form 5 upwards about the fifty different careers opportunities within their area of the armed forces. Representatives from the University of Dundee and Lancaster University talked to U6 and L6 pupils about courses and opportunities at those institutions. Lecturers from Stranmillis University College and Queen's School of Nursing & Midwifery talked to girls in the senior school about teaching and nursing/midwifery respectively. We were also delighted to host a presentation by a former pupil who talked to girls from Form 5 upwards about gap years on behalf of an organisation called Project Trust. Form 5 also had talks on law, medicine and engineering all delivered by former pupils. Careers guidance interviews are already underway for this year group and are conducted by Jill Lemon, our careers adviser from the Department of the Fonomy.

Some girls have attended careers sessions outside school. One girl attended a Deloitte Open Morning while thirteen U6 girls attended a QUB Medicine, Health & Life Sciences session at W5 where they gained insight into the world of research, careers and education in those areas and the girls

attended a range of practical workshops. In addition, two girls from U6 attended a 'Meet the Marines' careers event where they developed team-building and leadership skills and gained insight into this elite corps. Mrs Hearst has been delivering a series of sessions on providing advice on personal statements for particular courses. Most U6 girls have now submitted their UCAS forms and will be starting to prepare for their Mock Interview Evening after Halloween.



The whole of Form Two went on an outdoor pursuits day to Greenhill YMCA in Newcastle on 22 September. The weather was kind with glorious sunshine all day. Activities included canoeing, raft-building, a climbing tower, bouldering, ropes courses and archery. Girls were in groups of mixed form classes which allowed them to get to know a wider range of pupils in the year group. A number of team-building exercises helped pupils identify their own strengths and those of others, with many surprised by their own bravery when it came to activities like the zip-line or high ropes course. IPAD ROLLOUT

In September, we launched our Key Stage 3 1:1 iPad programme to enhance teaching and learning. This is part of a new digital technology initiative at Strathearn which will be rolling out over the next few years. KS3 students will use iPads in a 1:1 classroom environment, while pupils at KS4 and KS5 will have access to Chromebooks in School. All pupils in Forms 1 and 2 have been provided with an iPad Air for learning both in and outside of the classroom. Staff from iTeach set up and distributed the iPads, before providing the pupils with their first training session. In addition to the iPads, we have also invested in a number of apps which will help students with their learning, revision and school life. Teachers at Strathearn were issued their iPads in 2015, allowing time for training before beginning to use them in the classroom with students.
