<u>Careers Update Greenhill Trip</u>

Our first term got underway with many girls attending open days, talks and presentations. All U6 attended the Queen's Open Day while other pupils attended the Open Day at the Jordanstown campus of Ulster University. Many parents attended the UCAS Parents' Information Evening at the end of August which gave them a better understanding of the entire UCAS application process and many pupils have submitted their UCAS forms already.

We welcomed representatives from the University of Oxford, St Andrews and the University of Dundee who spoke to girls about opportunities at those institutions, while a speaker from the University of Law based at the Chester campus talked to pupils about applications for Law courses.

Mrs Hearst has been running a series of lunchtime sessions for guidance on writing personal statements for engineering, accountancy, business & finance, science, languages, history and geography. We have also had representatives from the army and from the nursing, teaching and veterinary science professions to inform the girls about those careers. Two girls from the Sixth Form attended a three-day STEMWEX course at Magilligan to learn more about STEM opportunities in the army, while one pupil in U6 attended at Dietetics Open Day at Knockbreda Health Centre. Form 3 had their Subject Mapping session which raised their awareness of potential careers and where jobs are likely to be in the future, and helped them to begin to consider choosing their GCSEs which they will do in Term 2. Finally, the Form 5 careers guidance interview programme has started with Jill Lemon, our careers adviser from the Department of the Economy, and our programme of guest speakers is underway with talks on engineering, law and medicine.

On 17 September, Form 2 spent the day taking part in teambuilding and outward-bound activities at Greenhill YMCA, Newcastle. Activities included raft-building, the climbing wall, the zip wire, canoeing, archery and high ropes courses. We had great weather and lots of girls had the opportunity to try something they had never done before and, in some cases, to face personal fears! It was a great opportunity for girls to mix with people from other form classes and just to enjoy being outside in the last breath of summer!
